Executive Summary:

The purpose of STormwater Outreach for Regional Municipalities (STORM), is to provide a platform for collaborative effort by which educational outreach may be provided to residents in the greater Phoenix area with the message of pollution prevention to keep our waters clean. In Fiscal Year 2016, STORM took great strides to increase its outreach ability, use innovation to address its audiences, and collaboration to espouse a regional method. As a result of the support of each member, STORM performed the following actions and agreements to affect the region:

• STORM made an agreement with <u>Solarflaredigital</u> to assist with maintaining our website, and STORM members altered the website to make it more usable. As a result, our website has recorded a total of 2,800 unique guests, with a total of 3,900 sessions, and 10,000 pages viewed.

One of the foundations of SUSTAINABILITY is caring for the environment. STORM espouses the idea of sustainability through the message of pollution prevention by encouraging citizens to change their behavior and create an environment that people will want to be in.



- STORM made an agreement with <u>Bear Essential News</u> to post ads in newspapers that are distributed throughout the Phoenix area for an estimated 1,000,000 views.
- STORM made an agreement with <u>Clear Channel Outdoor</u> to post ads on billboards throughout the region for the months of July and August creating a total of 30 Million impressions. Two weeks of the billboards were on construction, and the rest were general pollution prevention recognition.
- STORM made an agreement with <u>National CineMedia</u> for movie ads reaching over 3.8 Million movie goers.
- STORM made an agreement and significant planning activity with <u>Environmental Education</u> <u>Exchange</u> and created a middle school educational outreach book to be used in FY17.
- STORM sponsored its third <u>Statewide Stormwater Summit</u> for engineers, businesses, and municipalities to learn about current stormwater regulatory issues. This summit was a cooperative effort of STORM members, and with the assistance from ADOT, PAG, and other statewide stormwater representatives, over 135 attendees, held the most successful summit yet. The topics covered included Construction, Industrial, and Municipal compliance concerns.
- STORM held 12 monthly meetings, and produced 52 educational news announcements via email to its members and interested public to encourage networking, provide important information, and to keep the community aware of current stormwater related concerns.

STORM endeavors to be the premier source for Stormwater Outreach activity for the region, and wishes to thank each municipality for your continued support,

STORM FY16 Annual Report

A Not-for-Profit Organization

STORM was founded by a collaborative action of Phoenix valley municipalities in 2002 in response to federal regulations requiring certain municipalities to implement measures to educate the public on the protection of stormwater runoff quality. In December 2005, STORM filed for not-for-profit status with the Arizona Corporation Commission. The trade names "STormwater Outreach for Regional Municipalities (STORM)" and "STORM" were filed with the Secretary of State. STORM officially became a not-for-profit charitable organization in February 2006. This status allowed STORM to operate as a charitable organization, and enables tax deductible contributions to promote stormwater pollution prevention. STORM's original Operations Plan was modified and incorporated into By-Laws in February 2007, and further modifications were adopted at the annual corporation meeting in June of 2008.

STORM Membership

The STormwater Outreach for Regional Municipalities (STORM), is a regional organization promoting Stormwater Pollution Prevention education in and around the greater Phoenix metropolitan area. In Fiscal Year 2016 (FY16) STORM consisted of 26 members including:

STORM recognizes two categories of membership: municipal and affiliate members.

Municipal membership is open to Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) operators required by the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) to have an Arizona Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (AZPDES) municipal stormwater permit. To effectively reach residents and create a



regional message, municipal membership in STORM is limited to MS4 operators within the greater Phoenix metropolitan area.

Affiliate membership is open to jurisdictions and organizations that are not MS4 operators, or are not located in the greater Phoenix metropolitan area. The organization is governed by the municipal members, and as such, affiliate members are not allowed to vote on formal decisions made by the organization, but are strongly encouraged to actively participate in monthly meetings and take part in activities/events sponsored by STORM; STORM members must vote to include affiliate members.

Monthly Meetings

STORM meets monthly to make decisions, strategize, and collaborate on methods to educate the public about stormwater quality and stormwater program requirements. Meeting minutes are posted on STORM's website under the "Meetings" section of the page, linked here: http://www.azstorm.org/about-us/meetings

The meetings occur on the fourth Tuesday of each month at the Flood Control District of Maricopa County at 2801 West Durango, Phoenix, Arizona. STORM does not meet during the month of December due to Holiday conflicts and vacation scheduling.

The meetings are open to the public, and representatives from MS4s throughout Arizona are welcome to participate and access resources and information generated by STORM.

Management Board

STORM elects a management board annually to help organize and guide operations. The FY16 board consisted of five members elected by consensus of the municipal members for a fiscal year term: Chair, Co-Chair, Fiscal Agent, Secretary, and Director-at-Large. During FY16, STORM Board Members were:

- Chair: John Cummings, City of Phoenix
 The Chair is responsible for facilitating all STORM meetings and acting as the lead informational point of contact for the STORM organization.
- Co-chair: Drew Bryck, City of Avondale
 The Co-Chair assists the Chair as needed in facilitating STORM meetings and disseminating information about the organization.
- Fiscal Agent: Ramona Simpson, Town of Queen Creek
 The Fiscal Agent is responsible for providing and coordinating the collection and management of fees, other revenue and expenditures for the STORM organization.



- Secretary: Robert van den Akker, City of Buckeye,
 The Secretary is responsible for creating and distributing monthly meeting agendas, meeting notes, and distribution of news to the members.
- Director-at-Large: Justin Bern, Scottsdale, 2015, Tempe, 2016.
 The Director-at-Large may assist Board members as needed and provides a fifth vote to prevent ties during a vote by the Board members.

Fees


The annual membership fee for municipal members is based on population from the 2010 Census, and a flat fee was established for affiliate members:

During fiscal year 2016, participating municipalities and affiliates generated \$55,000 through membership fees. Additionally, active members provided significant contributions to the organization including: staff time, contract negotiation, product research, administrative assistance, writing and artistic input. Without overhead or minimal administrative costs, funds are almost exclusively used for program implementation activities. A FY16 financial summary is provided in Attachment A.

Outreach Area

During FY16, the 26 STORM members included six Phase I MS4s, nineteen Phase II MS4s and one Affiliate Member. From Peoria to Casa Grande, and from Buckeye to Apache Junction and beyond, these members have promoted stormwater pollution prevention to a very large area that includes significant portions of Maricopa County and Pinal County with a focus on the municipal areas outlined in the adjacent figure. Additional



information on membership requirements is detailed in the STORM bylaws.



Why Become a Member?

STORM has historically encouraged a perspective of regional collaboration to improve public outreach and education. Members meet monthly to discuss ideas, gather information, and share results of stormwater management tools, techniques, programs, and initiatives. The benefits of this collaborative effort include:

- Increased public awareness of the impacts of stormwater pollution
- Shared information and experiences
- Pooled financial resources
- · Protection of the environment, and
- Improved quality of life.

These ideas coincide with the regional outreach activity idea espoused by Joseph Salvato, a leader in environmental planning, who wrote in <u>ENVIRONMENTAL ENGINEERING FIFTH EDITION</u>, 2003.

"Local governments normally do not have jurisdiction and resources to plan and budget for an entire region. The key to the solution of regional problems is to create a spirit of intermunicipal cooperation that sets aside the unreasonable exercise of local prerogatives and instead provides a sense of team work to work toward establishment of an area wide organization that can investigate, plan, and act on an area wide basis.

Communities may realize a great economic benefit from their STORM membership investment. For a relatively small contribution, members receive a significant return in public outreach and education, and collective work and coordination of the group provides much more impact than a municipality would have obtained working independently. Based on the 2010 Census, approximately 3.8 million of the state's 6.4 million residents live in the greater Phoenix metropolitan area, providing a diverse audience for education efforts.

Membership in STORM also provides increased buying power that helps achieve bulk pricing on promotional items. The ability to cooperatively apply for grants and other financial assistance helps further the common goal of public education to reduce surface water pollutants and ultimately improve water quality at a regional level. Additionally, participation with STORM allows for increased information sharing and networking among permit coordinators, allowing for an increased understanding in permit compliance.



Key Accomplishments

The success of STORM is based on the synergy of resources, ideas, and talent to produce regional education and outreach. The accomplishments of this collaborative effort include:

STORM Bylaws

The Bylaws of STORM have been created to allow for affiliate membership and sponsors for the organization. This allows STORM to actively pursue funding outside of the municipal membership while having developed specific guidelines for affiliate members and sponsors to follow. The Bylaws have been posted on STORM's website since FY08.

MEDIA CAMPAIGNS

STORM Slogan: "Only Rain in the Storm Drain"

STORM member agencies continued to express the consistent regional message of "Only Rain in the Storm Drain." Members believe this slogan is easily understood and clearly communicates the basic message of keeping pollutants out of the storm drain system. This message was communicated through the STORM website, brochures, display boards, and promotional items. Additionally, STORM has collaborated and sponsored the Maricopa County Environmental Services Department (MCESD) in an ongoing initiative to reach K – 8 school age children that started in 2014. The slogan for the MCESD outreach activity is: "Make Clean Storm Drains Happen," and uses the Sonoran Salamander cartoon character as their mascot. Storm has not officially adopted this slogan, or mascot, but is happy to participate in likeminded outreach activities in the region.

STORM Web Site

STORM's web site, www.azstorm.org, promotes stormwater pollution prevention. It provides residents with direct links to their specific communities so they can receive individualized information and provides summaries of stormwater regulations. Frequently updated with relevant information and news, the STORM website continues to be maintained to match modern technology of handheld device use. STORM has an ongoing agreement with a consultant as well as domain ownership to keep the page active and updated for a cost of \$681 for this year. Members provide individual municipal information, and update the online calendar to share dates of educational events throughout the year. An analytical summary of the web site activity during FY16 is included below, and a picture of the homepage may be seen in Appendix B.

Additionally, the STORM website is referenced by similar groups nationwide as we provide outreach information that is applicable to all ages and various regions.



Billboard Initiative

One of the purposes of STORM is to make as much of an impact on the public as possible. With this in mind, STORM ran a billboard campaign to direct people to think about pollution and to think about linking to the website for more information. This campaign ran for two months during this reporting

year, and

included a large number of digital billboards located along major transportation routes of the region. The billboards for this fiscal year ran from July 1- August 23 (53 days), and included information on pollution prevention and construction. The website was updated concurrently with the billboard messages for a charge of \$28,140.

Clear Channel analysis includes the audience delivery impressions on 22 panels including 20 digital panels and 2 static panels. The total

delivery for the month July and August was approximately 30,213,425 impressions (adult 18+).

Facebook

STORM has been attempting to obtain impact using social media outlets. Social media impact is typically obtained and measured through Reach, Organic Reach, and Engagement Rate.



- Reach is the number of people who have seen a post
- Organic reach is the total number of unique people who were shown a post
- Engagement rate is the percentage of people who saw a post that liked, shared, clicked or commented on it.

STORM took the Facebook posting activity on as a subcommittee action, to perform and maintain the Facebook page during FY16. There were 160 posts placed on our Facebook page, with a total reach of 2188 viewers. There was no direct cost to STORM for this activity, and the total Impact Reach, Organic Reach, and Engagement Rate obtained still remains low. STORM members remain persistant with this effort in the hope that it will grow over time.

Movie Theater Campaign

STORM hired Scott Strubbe of NATIONAL CINEMEDIA to run the ad. This ad ran for three months starting in November, including the Star Wars The Force Awakens opening in December, and running through February. This coincided with the winter rainy season and reached approximatly 3.8 Million viewers. The ad ran in 9 theaters with a total of 158 screens, and cost \$15,453. It included the following theaters:

Additionally, STORM was able to provide an ad in Harkins theaters at no charge to the organization. Because the ad ran for as a public service announcement, demographics and impressions was not



available; however, when compared to the paid ad, it is estimated that the number of people reached was approximately 1 million viewers. The static presentation of this ad is below:



Bear Essential News (BEN)

STORM has made significant strides to perform outreach to the child market with the idea that impacting children will impact a family's decision making processes. To implement this idea, STORM continued to sponsor the K-8 outreach class activities of the Maricopa County ESD Stormwater Quality Program offered throughout the county, and paid for multiple ads in the regional student educational newspaper. The audience for this media ad was parents and children in the greater Phoenix area. STORM paid for 6 ads this year, as well as a carryover of 4 ads printed during this fiscal year, but paid in the previous fiscal year.

Distributed to 375 elementary and middle schools each month, the BEN newspaper goes out to the following districts: Creighton, Deer Valley, Madison, Paradise Valley, Roosevelt, scottsdale, Washington, Chandler, Gilbert, Higley, Mesa, Queen Creek, Tempe, Alhambra, Avondale, Cartwright, Dysart, Glendale, Liitchfield, Pendergast, Peoria, Phoenix, plus additional charter and private schools. Half-page, color ads ran on December 2015, January 2016, February 2016, March 2016, April 2016, May 2016 (May issue included a bump up to Full page and included a main feature on Water Conservation). The total cost was \$6,500 with a reach of 110,000 newspapers per month, for 700,000* estimated views.

Additional outreach: The Bear Essential News website also featured a STORM tile ad on Bear Teacher Resource Tab with a total of 80 hits, and a BEN Email Promotion to 4,500 kids, teachers, parents, and businesses on exclusive BEN lists received two email blasts.



* Bear has always been very conservative on the estimated number of impressions. The standard print model is 3.3 impressions per copy; however, to be conservative, BEN generally uses the circulation number because it is so high. The avearage outreach numbers for circulation include:

A monthly edition of Bear Essential News has a less than 4% return, which is very good. Over 73%** of the papers that go home with the kids were looked at by parents as well. So, if with 115,000 directly in the hands of kids and an additional 85,000 pass through to parents—we reach 200,000 people every month, and this does not include the teachers who also read this paper!

OUTREACH EVENTS

Between all of the member municipalities, there were a total of 231 events (17 less than in FY15), 38,105 promotional items and brochures distributed (23,074 more items than in FY15), and 56,8120 attendees to events with 24,839 people directly contacted with the stormwater pollution prevention message (14,113 more direct contacts with people than in FY15). An online reporting entry form was used by all members to document the use of STORM display boards and promotional items. The member's reporting spreadsheet is provided in Attachment C.




K – 8 Classroom Activities

Maricopa County Environmental Services Department, Stormwater Quality Program, created an outreach program to children throughout Maricopa County in 2014. This year, the program performed 87 workshops in grades K – 8, having direct contact with 7,691 students (3,986 more students than in FY15) using interactive, hands on presentations. A list of the classes may

be seen on the Maricopa County website, and include the following:

- 1. Adventures with Sam the Salamander Grade K
- 2. Be Watershed Wise Grades 1-2
- 3. Keeping it Clean Grades 3-4
- 4. The Peril of Impervious Surfaces Grades 5-6
- 5. Water Detectives Grades 7-8

STORM is proud to have taken part in supporting the Maricopa County Environmental Services Department educational outreach activity. Maricopa County has earned the 2016 National Association of Counties award for its School Outreach Program. Since 2012, the MC Environmental Services Department has been re-working their outreach program. In 2014, they incorporated a mascot, Sam the Salamander, a slogan, *Make Clean Storm Drains Happen*, and a multi-grade educational lesson program to ramp up the school age stormwater education. The program outperformed





permit requirements for classroom training, and owes some of its success to alignment with the Arizona Science State Standard, which was achieved by seamlessly meshing stormwater lessens with grade specific school curriculums. This approach has created a unique learning atmosphere for k-8 students. Program success has been measured by the rise in teacher class requests and the surge of school age children trained.

Display Boards

Display boards for use at community outreach events have been previously developed illustrating the difference between sanitary sewer systems and storm drain systems and provide information on ways residents can limit adding pollutants to stormwater. These display boards are available for use by STORM members at local events. In FY 2013, STORM spent




\$2,528.81 on two new sets of vertical display boards. More from the display boards can be seen in Attachment B.

Promotional Items

Various promotional items have been previously developed with STORM's logo, website address, and/or stormwater related slogans. These items are made available to members to distribute at local events. STORM spent \$16,127 on promotional items. Additionally, STORM had promotional items left over from previous years that were also used during this fiscal year. The following items were purchased and distributed to members this year:

- 1. Magnet word-scramble STORM is continuously experimenting with outreach efforts and promotional items in an attempt to gain citizens attention with the stormwater pollution prevention message. This year it purchased refrigerator magnet word scramble pads with stormwater related messages and words. 745 where handed out this year.
- Grocery Bags A reusable grocery bag or "sack bag" with the stormwater pollution prevention message was handed out at events.
 STORM worked collaboratively with the <u>Heal Our Waterways Program of</u> <u>Wilmington NC Stormwater Services</u> to create this bag, and 1,576 bags were handed out this year.
- STORMWATER IN THE DESERT STORM collaborated with the <u>Environmental Education Exchange</u> to develop a grade 6-8 activity book. STORM spent \$12,100 in its development with the hope to share the





book with the region and promote outreach to the middle school age group in FY17.

4. **Other items STORM members use:** STORM Frisbees, brochures, drawstring packs, jar openers, color changing cups, Magnetic note pads, color changing pencils, and bags on board.

Printed Materials

- 1. STORM had a brochure professionally printed during FY13. STORM continues to use brochures purchased in previous years.
- 2. STORM developed a construction brochure with tips for preventing stormwater pollution associated with construction projects during FY 2010. These were still being distributed to residents during FY16.

Radio Campaigns

STORM did not conduct a radio ad campaign during FY16.

Sponsored Activities

STORM held another Statewide Stormwater Summit, having initiated the summit in 2013, hosting another in 2014, and the current summit in 2016.

Held in the Phoenix ADOT offices, this summit had a three session approach, offering information to engineers, construction contractors, and to the MS4 community. Presenters included members from the MS4 community, local engineering firms, and representatives from ADEQ. This event, on May 3, 2016, had 135 attendees, and was operated by a subcommittee of STORM, included joint



sponsorship with PAG, and committee members from outside of the Phoenix region.

SHARED RESOURCES

Benefits of this collaborative and clearly focused effort include shared resources. Such resources include the following:

Maricopa County Water Runoff Models: The City of Chandler and Maricopa County has
offered STORM members the use of this model for demonstrating how to prevent pollutants
from entering the stormwater system.



- City of Phoenix's Storm Drain Marker Template: The City of Phoenix had previously developed a template of a storm drain marker created for use on their catch basins and has shared this template with STORM members, minimizing the cost of producing these markers to other members. During FY 2007, Phoenix re-established a contract with a local foundry to produce these markers and all members were invited to utilize the negotiated pricing structure.
- **City of Phoenix Storm Drain Study:** The City of Phoenix conducts an annual poll of Valley residents to assess residents' knowledge of storm drain pollution. This study, and the potential to add specific questions, assists STORM in targeting particular audiences or determining success in outreach efforts.
- **Storm Drain Dan Coloring Books:** The City of Phoenix previously developed three books related to preventing stormwater pollution. These are posted on STORM's website and are available for production to STORM members.
- Maricopa County Annual Stormwater Poster Contest: The Maricopa County Environmental Services Department Stormwater Quality Program has conducted an annual stormwater poster contest. Pollution awareness education is provided in schools and student poster creations are scheduled to be used throughout the next fiscal year on the STORM Facebook page.
- Maricopa County Survey Data: Beginning in FY 2009, the results of the survey are used to structure future outreach efforts and educational programs. The purpose of the survey was to monitor County residents' awareness of stormwater pollution. More specifically, the study focused on the following areas:
 - Effectiveness of the County's public outreach campaign
 - o Attitudes about threats posed by stormwater pollution
 - Knowledge of contributors to stormwater pollution
 - Personal practices of waste disposal
 - The results of the survey, presented below, will be used to direct the public outreach and education efforts of the Stormwater Program
 - Summary of Findings
 - Approximately 59% of respondents recalled reading, hearing, or seeing messages about stormwater pollution
 - Only 9% thought stormwater runoff lead to a sanitary sewer that leads to a treatment plant.
 - 77.3% do not always pick after their dog and dispose of it in the trash
 - 59.1% wash their vehicle at home on the concrete driveway
 - 22.7% of respondents felt that pet waste posed minimal or no threat
 - The best way to supply information was tied between the Maricopa County website, live presentations, and Informational brochures at public events.
 - 36.4% of respondents thought construction activities, grey water, and herbicides/pesticides were a serious threat.



Vendor Information: Stormwater product vendors may present a 30 to 60 minute
informational session to the STORM members. This allows members with product knowledge
to share their experiences with members that may be interested in a particular product.
 STORM held a number of vendor presentations. These may be seen in the FY16 meeting
minutes posted on the STORM website.

Awards and Recognition

STORM is the first regional stormwater public education and outreach organization in Arizona. The collaborative, voluntary, and highly organized approach to disseminating information and resources to residents throughout the greater Phoenix metropolitan area has provided a distinctive and effective means to reduce stormwater pollution while maximizing the benefit of shared resources.

Previously, STORM had been nominated for the following awards/recognition:

- Valley Forward's Environmental Excellence Award in the category of Environmental Education/Communication - Public Sector. This award recognizes outstanding contributions to the sustainability of the Valley communities.
- Maricopa Association of Governments' Desert Peak Award. An award that recognizes people, projects, and partnerships that have demonstrated a commitment to regionalism.

During FY16, a STORM sponsored program, the Maricopa County Environmental Services K-8 Youth Education program, was nominated and won the NACo award for Educational Outreach to Youth. It is the interaction and collaborative effort of its members that makes the region great, and STORM is proud to be a part of it.



Flash Flooding

Many of you may be aware of the flash flooding that hit US894 between Marble Cenyon and House Rock Valley on August Sth. The rain total was between 1.3 and 1.7 inches in 15-20 minutes and is an estimated 200 year event. The really large (trailer-size) boulders in some of the photos were washed down to the culverts from House Rock Valley which is about 1.5 miles upstream. Some of these were actually pushed up onto the road surface when they met the culverts.
